This week in Nursery the children have been learning about fossils and dinosaur bones! In KG, the children have decorated their very own egg as part of Miss Hayley's humanities Easter competition. KG, Year 1 and Year 2 have participated in a house tower building competition . In IPC, Year 3 began the topic 'Bright Sparks'. The children learnt what electricity is, how it was discovered and is generated. They identified which appliances use electricity at school and how to keep themselves safe. Year 4, have been working so hard with their learning. They are still excited by exploring After school activities. and investigating their science topic, while in English they have been writing their own suspense stories with great results. An Inspector Calls



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Year 9 Forensic Science

As a prelude to reading Arthur Conan Doyle's The Disappearance of Lady Frances Carfax (the main protagonist being the infamous Sherlock Holmes), the Year Nine students undertook a unit on forensics to explore a range of English language activities in a 'real life' situation where they had to solve a crime. In the lead-up to the 'crime' students learned how to identify different fingerprint types as well as how to lift a fingerprint from a surface; they analysed 'blood splatter' from a range of heights identifying significant features for each height; they took plaster moulds of shoe prints which they then linked to specific shoes, and, they also learned different methods of code and cryptography.

On the day of the 'crime', the students were provided with a 'police statement' which described a ransacked room and the death of a toy dog. In the room they found a coded note which, once deciphered, stated the class sloth - had been kidnapped. The students donned 'CSI" suits and collected evidence such as fingerprints; hair samples, photographs of shoes prints and the measuring and

analysis of blood splatter. The students then took 'witness' statements which lead them from one teacher to another, and eventually to the culprits. As a culminating activity, the students wrote a news report on the crime.
