some minibeasts craft together with their parents. KG2 have finished learning all of their tricky words for their Phase 3 phonics. In mathematics, KG1 have been working on length and height. The videos from their at home volcano experiments have been wonderful! In IPC this week, the children in Year 1 and Year 2 have been talking about how circus acts in the past have changed to those seen now. It was fantastic to see how such very young people can discuss why they think it is better for animals such as elephants, sea lions and chimpanzees, to be left to live their life safely in the wild. They listened and put forward their ideas, whilst respecting the thoughts and beliefs of others. In IPC, the Year 3 students continued 'How human's work' by investigating nutrition. They identified that they cannot make their own food like plants do; they get nutrition from what they eat. They understood that animals, including humans, need the right types of nutrition, by examining food and nutrient groups. Year 4 has

come this week to the launch of a new IPC topic, a new book in English and the start of revising the mathematics' curriculum before the end of year assessments. But it's not all work, work, work! They have managed to make time for some fun Investigations too! Year 5 class focused on measurements that incorporated capacities (metric and imperial) along with volume. In English they learnt more about the Iron Man - a mysterious giant figure who willingly hurls himself off a cliff but....In IPC the children thoroughly enjoyed reading a graphic novel with no words about a migrant in a foreign land. Year 6 students completed their unit on the true and fascinating adventure story 'Ice Trap!'. The students mapped the Antarctic voyage, which began in 1914, and dated each of the main events. After that, they created a storyboard of the main events with pictures and descriptive captions. Finally, they watched a short documentary of one of the greatest real life survival stories in human history.
